A.E. Waite's Devil-Worship in France, rather than being an infernal how-to book or even a history of what the title purports, is in fact an examination of a most sensational hoax perpetrated by Parisian journalist, Leo Taxil. Taxil and fictitious associate, Diana Vaughan, created a scandal in the late 1800s by reporting on a most heinous occult sect, the "Palladian Masons," that admitted women and performed diabolic acts of "Luciferian Spiritism." Taxil's "revelation" of this secret society and its supposed links to Freemasonry and other occult organizations, created a public hysteria and outcry

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against all things occult, especially secret societies. A.E. Waite's response, *Devil-Worship in France*, is his satirical and somewhat farcical interpretation of this sensationalization and persecution of occult groups in France at that time. This work, along with similar refutations by French occultist Papus, raised questions Taxil could not answer, and he was forced to admit that the reports were a hoax meant to ridicule both the Catholic Church and Freemasonry. This republication of *Devil-Worship in France* is the first reprint of the book in nearly one hundred years. A.E. Waite then wrote *Diana Vaughan and the Question of Modern Palladism*, the sequel to *Devil-Worship in France*, where he reexamined and re-presented the telling of the hoax in a straightforward manner- without the satire and farce. Published for the first time, here, finally, is the whole story behind the hoax that slandered occult communities throughout Europe in the late 1800s. R.A. Having been a close observer of President Felsenburgh's rise, Father Franklin is called to Rome, a Hong Kong-style enclave ruled by Pope John XXVI and raised to the College of Cardinals. Meanwhile, defections among bishops and priests increase. At Cardinal Franklin's instigation, the pope abolishes the Eastern Catholic Churches and forms a new religious order, the Order of Christ Crucified. All its members, including the Pope, vow to die in the name of the faith.

The figure of the zombie that entered the popular imagination with the publication of William Seabrook's *The Magic Island* (1929)—during the American occupation of Haiti—still holds cultural currency around the world. This book calls for a rethinking of zombies in a sociopolitical context through the examination of several films, including *White Zombie* (1932), *The Love Wanga* (1935), *I Walked with a Zombie* (1943) and *The Serpent and the Rainbow* (1988). A 21st-century film from Haiti, *Zombi candidat à la présidence ... ou les amours d'un zombi*, is also examined. A reading of *Heading South* (2005), a film about the female tourist industry in the Caribbean, explores zombification as a consumptive process driven by capitalism.

Thinly spread out among the mountain regions of Turkey, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Iran, Syria, and Iraq, this dwindling faith has managed to survive 2,000 years of repeated massacres. Frequently confused with the Dacoits and Thugees of India they seem to have every mans hand raised against them. In the 1930's Hollywood developed horror movies featuring assorted monsters such as Frankenstein, the Wolfman, Dracula, and the Mummy. At this point the hero bursts in to defeat the villain and rescue the maiden. Thinly disguised allusions to the Yezidees hinted at the actual existence of a dread cult of devil worshipers on Earth. Naturally, they got it all wrong! Hollywood has seldom been accused of not warping reality to make their case. Garbled accounts of the Yezidees are their only contact with reality and the outcome was a forgone conclusion. All sorts of fundamentalist preachers picked up on the theme in their sermons. Using the Yezidee as a prime example of the wickedness which stalks the earth. In every telling the distortions grew until the Yezidee were virtually lost within the cloud of myth. So who are the Yezidee? What is their faith? Why are they dismissed as "Devil Worshipers"? Do they actually worship the Devil, (or Shaitan, or Eblis as the various religious sects name the Evil One)? Little is know about the rituals of these people, and most of what is known has been corrupted and mangled. This is largely because they are intensely secretive about the details of their religion. Commendable work has been done to record their music and their dances which may have foreshadowed the "Whirling Dervishes" of the Sufi Moslem sect. Their medicine and general healing practices have been recorded but their theology is

hardly known by anyone not of their faith. Here we address these problems through a careful examination of the scanty available data, and attempt to reconstruct a general picture of the sect. Starting at its inception and into present day to projecting a probable future. Since it is primarily a sociological problem, no absolute answers can be promised. Still this is apt to be the most accurate analysis ever attempted. At the least it provides a worthwhile starting point for future understanding of the sect.
